## **MVA Donation Program**

## For a Worthy Cause

If you're a member of the USS Midway Museum and receive its quarterly newsletter, *Midway Currents*, you know how successful the museum's education program has become, helping children all across California and beyond.

And the USS Midway Veterans Association is doing its part to help the cause! Last year, our members made major charitable donations to the museum, to its bench program in honor of our founder, as well as to its Annual Fund.

These donations have placed us on the museum's Honor Wing Wall, and we plan to keep our name there for years to come through our charitable donations to the museum.

To back up this commitment, we've pledged 20 percent of our annual membership fees (dues) to the museum's DJO Global "No Child Left Ashore" scholarship program.

In the last quarter of 2011, we applied to become a taxexempt organization (501(c)(3)) with the IRS, and when we achieve this status, our members' donations to the museum's scholarship program will be tax deductible.

"I believe strongly in our donation program," MVA President Oscar Granger said. "And I think our members feel the same way. In D.C., we plan to hold several raffles to raise money for the museum's scholarship program, and all profits will be donated to that program."

#### **Gunner's Mate Third Class**

Gene Slingerland was just a kid, age 17, when he joined the Navy in 1943 with his parents' permission. The world was at war, and within a year Gene found himself on the crew of the *USS Phelps* (DD-360) in the frigid waters of the North Atlantic fighting German U-boats determined to send allied cargo ships to the bottom of the sea. Gene's job was to man the guns, for he was a gunner's mate.



"It was a wet and wild ride," he recalled of his time on the Phelps on convoy duty. He didn't know it then, but it was the tail end of the war.

When World War II came to an abrupt end, Gene found himself without a ship, for the Phelps was headed for decommissioning.

He requested submarine duty, a curious choice, given that he had spent the last half year on a tin can hellbent on sinking same.

Fortunately, the Navy rescued Gene from himself, and instead of a sub out of Pearl, he received orders to a brand-new aircraft carrier out of Norfolk – the *USS Midway* (CB-41)

Thus, GMSN Gene Slingerland joined the commissioning crew of the mightiest warship ever built by the U.S. Navy to that point. The state-of-the-art aircraft carrier was beginning her long and illustrious career, and Gene would ride her for her first 2 years.

"In seeing the ship for the first time it was indeed an eye-opener," he said. "Because of my gunnery-school experience, I was included in the early on-board gunmount checks and receiving and storing of ammunitions. It was quite a feat to get everything in order."

He was there for the new carrier's early missions. "After her commissioning on 10 September 1945 [Newport News, VA], the next thing to come was the shakedown cruise in the Caribbean and then joining the U.S. Atlantic Fleet and named as the flagship for CAR DIV.1."

Gene, very familiar with the famously frigid seas of the North Atlantic from his Phelps duty, was out there again, this time on Midway's Operation Frostbite cruise.

"In March [1946] she tested equipment for cold weather operations in the North Atlantic," he remembered. "They were able to find some pretty bad weather and found a few of her weak spots. Test firing of guns went quite well, even in freezing conditions."

A member of the upper gun-mount crew. the young gunner's mate was kept plenty busy during his 2 years on the ship. "It took great teamwork and precise movements in there [speaking of the gun-mount], but we got it done," he recalled. He made GM3 about 1 year into his Midway tour of duty, and was discharged in late '47.

There were nearly 160 guns on Midway during her early years, he said. "... nine 5" 54-caliber single-mounts on each side of the ship – and around eighty 40mm guns, spread around, some on the bow, some on the fantail and elsewhere. There also were 60 or so 20mm cannons. All in all, she was pretty well protected."

As a crewman who worked closely with the ship's armament, Gene wonders what happened to all those guns as museum pieces. "It's too bad that the visitors to the ship now have no idea how well-armed the ship was at one time," he said, "and that no samples of the weapons are on display, he concluded."

Gene and three other Midway plankowners were presented WWII Victory Medals at our 2010 reunion in San Diego. RADM Mac McLaughlin, President and CEO of the USS Midway Museum, and Oscar Granger, President of the MVA, made the presentation. "I thoroughly enjoyed the 2010 reunion in San Diego," Gene said. "Not sure I'll make Washington, DC, maybe the next one will be back here."

Gene lives in Hemet, California (approximately 80 miles north of San Diego). He moved there with his late wife Ann-Marie in 1950 from his hometown of Olean, New York.

"We raised three great kids who gave us four grandkids. I worked in various sales positions, and we enjoyed our life together. As you will see by the pictures [below], I enjoy building remote-control boats and playing the organ." A licensed pilot for many years, he also enjoyed flying his own plane.

Gene, thank you for your dedicated service to your country. You answered your country's call to action and are truly a member of America's "Greatest Generation."
