Announcing MVA's SD17 Reunion — Grand Banquet on Flight Deck!

Dear Midway Veterans, family members and friends, it's all hands on deck, quite literally, because the USS Midway Veterans Association (MVA) is proud to announce that it will hold its next reunion September 11-13, 2017 (Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday), in San Diego, and our Grand Banquet will be held on the flight deck of the USS Midway Museum! We recommend that you arrive a day early (Sunday, September 10) to register for the reunion and be ready to go on Monday. On banquet night, the MVA will team with the USS Midway Museum to hold a special ceremony honoring this nation's POWs/MIAs. We haven't picked a keynote speaker yet, but we have some excellent candidates in mind, and we'll be ready to announce our choice soon.

Our reunion hotel is the **Wyndham San Diego Bayside** (WSDB), which is within easy walking distance of the USS Midway Museum (http://www.midway.org/), downtown shopping, fine restaurants and entertainment. Our negotiated room rate of \$153/night is only \$14 higher than it was for our 2015 reunion (also at WSDB), and these rates are good for 3 days before and 3 days after the reunion,

assuming rooms are available. This rate is very competitive with other hotels in the downtown area, and its close proximity to the ship and waterfront, plus its many other amenities, including a great hospitality room, made it an easy choice.

The Monument Man



From USS Midway Cook to Historical Memorial Preservationist

When I was on the USS Midway as a 2nd class, and then after I made 1st class, I worked in the Forward Bakeshop as the Cake Decorator and then Bakeshop Supervisor. Little did I realize that my attention to detail that I was perfecting decorating cakes would eventually turn into a hobby more than 30 years later. I practiced over and over designs for cakes, coming up with a different design each day to place on the mess decks for the crew to enjoy. I was honoring my fellow sailors' departments and did so by a different design each day. I did old ships, new ships, squadron emblems and jets.

You may ask what this has to do with a hobby I started 30 years later. Well, I'm now preserving memorials and markers that honor our veterans and historical events. Emblems that were designed for cakes I have now cleaned on memorial markers around Bremerton, Washington, and up and down western Washington. To date I have restored over 300 granite markers and almost 100 brass memorials. I even restored the USS Midway plaque on Bremerton's boardwalk.



After preserving and refurbishing most of the memorials around the Bremerton area and our county, I was asked to expand my horizon. In response, I looked at a listing of veterans and historical artifacts in our area. There were anchors, guns off of WWII ships and even a jet fighter from the Vietnam era here in our local area.

I asked local veterans' organizations how many memorials were in our area and was told 27. Well, after restoring all the plaques on Bremerton's boardwalk (over

300), I knew the number was much higher, and so I went throughout our county driving from the northernmost city to the farthest south and have discovered almost 100 memorials. Since restoring them, I have now documented over 100. I get the local stores to donate materials and sailors volunteer off of the ships in port to assist in refurbishing the memorials.



Last year I finished refurbishing all the memorials in Kitsap County and was then asked assist the Ladies of the Daughters of the American Revolution in restoring and refurbishing historical plaques. I agreed and have gone as far as Deception Pass (by Whidbey Island Naval Air Station) in the northern area of western Washington to the southern part of the state, Vancouver, following the Oregon Trail in Washington. It is a set of 11 markers from Vancouver to Olympia that were placed in 1916 by the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution. My tie to this group is that I have proven that through Genealogical evidence that my 4th Great Grandfather served in the Revolutionary War.

Another aspect of restoring and refurbishing memorials is working in and around some of the older cemeteries in our area. Through the course of this work, I have discovered that we have a Medal of Honor recipient buried in three of our local cemeteries and a least four Bronze Star recipients. Their memorial tombstones are cleaned and restored with honor and dignity, something that has been lost over the years as family members move away from the areas that their loved ones grew up in.

You never know when the experience and knowledge you gained on the USS Midway will assist in a project 30 years later.

Having Some "Extra" Fun

From 1958 to 1960, I served as an Electricians Mate (EM) aboard the mighty USS Midway, traveling the world over and visiting many exotic ports. My son was a stage actor doing "Background / Extra" work on various TV shows being filmed in the area the Dallas area. I was asked to join him on the set during filming

of the TV show "Dallas." I became a "Preferred Background / Extra" as a result and was in several episodes. I became hooked and started to work on several shows being filmed in the area. While most of the work has been for TV, some has also been on documentaries, such as "Hillary's America - The Movie," which recently ran in theaters across the country. I was a 2015 Senator in a Senate scene where the Slavery issue was being fought over passionately, which was a lot of fun, and took over a full day of shooting to create a 15-minute scene.



During the past few years as I became older, "Background Actor" work has become more of a hobby than anything, and I enjoy the work, and mostly enjoy the various costumes, and roles I get to play. Most recently I have worked in the Austin, Texas, area with a casting agency for various TV shows being filmed there. Being a "Background Actor – Extra" is fun, and we get to meet many of the big-time TV actors we work with. While there is not supposed to be any contact, and some are not approachable, there are many who are just regular

people. The best part of the "job" is learning how these shows are made, and that sometimes a simple "take" may take a few hours to film a 30 second shot, and sometimes a set will take several days to get the correct scene shot due to weather, and many, many factors as everything has to be perfect for the director to accept the scene, and wrap the shot. A couple of photos were shot of different roles I have worked on, on sets where cellphone photos were allowed. On most sets, however, there are strict rules that no photos are allowed.

The best part about this hobby is that I get paid for doing it, and most of the time we are just sitting around waiting for the scene to be shot and/or for the professional actors to get their lines correct. Also, it's fun watching a show on TV where we are



working in the background, while the (front) actors are doing their thing professionally.

Could This Be the Birth of "Midway Magic"?

As I see it, the term "Midway Magic" was born during the period leading up to the Battle of Midway, when in a meeting at Naval headquarters in Pearl Harbor, Ad miral Chester Nimitz asked for a name for the rendezvous point for our fleet to intercept the Japanese fleet, and "Point Luck" was chosen. Or so at least it was depicted in the movie "Battle of Midway," and I believe it is true. Could it be, then, that this was when Midway Magic was born? I believe so. Thinking back to when we broke the Japanese code and learned that Midway Island was the target that Admiral Yamamoto picked for his next attack on U.S. forces, it makes sense.

As the battle began, a certain bit of luck came into play with the splitting of Torpedo Squadron Eight, with some of the planes in that squadron coming from the USS Hornet and some coming from Midway Island. It is a small thing, but there were many small things that added up to a huge success in our favor. With the inferior




number of ships we had in the battle, we should have lost but, of course, we did not, and the tides of war in the Pacific turned in our favor with the victory in the ocean off of Midway. That in itself is enough to make me think the details I describe above led to the birth of Midway Magic. And that Magic carries on to this day on board the USS MIDWAY CV-41 and with any individual or group still connected to the Midway.

There is no upfront charge to reserve a room, and you can cancel your room up to 10 days before the reunion, should you need to change your plans.

I have every reason to believe we will set another attendance record for this reunion (the promise of dinner on the flight deck of the USS Midway seems to be a lure that causes former Midway sailors in large numbers to be drawn back to their former home). One big change here

from days gone-by, I promise we will not conduct air ops during dinner. Here is a pitch to sign up now for our third visit to the WSDB. It's a first-rate hotel, located within walking distance of the ship. You also get a prime, downtown location with shopping, attractions, and restaurants near by.

This year's planning process is a mix of old and new. We will again be using Armed Forces Reunions (AFR) as our professional reunion planner for the nuts and bolts part of SD17. The new twist is that for the first time there will be an MVA Reunion Planning Committee picking our tours and activities, and then managing all aspects of making sure events go on without a hitch (or at least go very smoothly). Past experience has shown me that glitches always occur, but good planning and creative problem solving will reduce or eliminate bumps in the road. Once our activities have been selected and priced we will launch our Registration Form so you can begin selecting (and paying for) what you want to do during SD17.

The pieces are falling into place for our 2017 reunion in San Diego, and we're looking forward to hosting what we hope will be the largest turnout ever of "Midway Nation" enthusiasts — that is, Midway veterans and their families and friends.



First off, I'd like to thank the team of Marion (Mick) Hersey, Ken Radak, and Marty FitzGerald for conducting a professional review of our financial records on October, 28, in Renton, WA.; also, Bob Srabian (MVA's CPA) provided valuable guidance on the questions to ask. My wife and I were very impressed and relieved with how smoothly things went at MVA's first-ever financial review. Mina Jo Payson is the Treasurer's Treasurer and my "comptroller." Of that we can be certain.

Midway veterans are a unique group, to be sure. We crewed the ship and piloted her planes for over half the

20th century, at a time when the Midway was arguably the most powerful warship on the planet. Now, in this century, we are key players in the phenomenon that is the USS Midway Museum in San Diego, rescued as she was from the Mothball Fleet over a dozen years, she has become a world-class museum ship, with a 1 million-plus visitors touring her every year. Just this past month, in an online contest sponsored by USA Today, she was voted America's top museum ship, in a competition with nineteen other museum ships around the country.

This contest was not without its drama. In the final days of the voting, the Battleship Iowa Museum inexplicably jumped ahead of the Midway Museum, which prompted the Midway forces to swing into action. "Man your GQ stations!" rang out across the country. We at the MVA received an old-school telephone call from a volunteer at the museum asking if we could help get out the vote. In response, I, who run MVA's "Combat Information Center" in my back room, fired up our E-blast system and launched a series of messages to several hundred Midway veterans around the country. They responded accordingly and overwhelmingly with votes for the Midway Museum. The gauntlet had been thrown; no way were we going to be outdone by a battleship, of all things. When the smoke had cleared two days later, USA Today announced Midway the winner in a come-from-behind victory! This shouldn't have surprised anyone, of course, and it didn't.

The moral of the story: Never underestimate the forces of "Midway Magic" to do good.

Finally, I would like to thank those men who contributed articles for this newsletter: Tim Miller, Marty FitzGerald, Mick Hersey and Jim Yoder. I encourage all readers of this newsletter to send in their own stories for publication here. We all have these great stories to tell.

Midway's "Flying M" Patch Rides Again

Over the years of my Navy career, I had accumulated many patches from the various ships and stations I served. I was looking through a pile of these a while back and remembered a patch from my first ship, the USS Midway, that I called "The Flying M" patch that was missing. I wanted one for my collection (actually, for a display I was making), so I searched the Internet and found nothing like it for sale. But I did find a small picture of it (shown here).



Determined to find one of these patches, I found email addresses for several "old salts" who served on the Midway in the 40s and 50s, looking for someone who might have a patch, and/or if they would want one. I received several replies like they had heard of it, or seen one. Most never heard of it, but one did say he had one and gave me the wing span. A couple people said they were given to pilots. (Ah-ha, no wonder most never heard of it!) But, best of all, most of them said they would like to have one.

So I submitted an RFQ to several vendors to fabricate some from that little picture [of the patch from the Internet shown above]. The one I selected took 3 or 4 months to finally get a pattern made to my satisfaction. I ordered enough for all who said they wanted one, plus a few more, since the more I bought the cheaper they were. Figured I can easily reorder more if necessary, since I now know an embroiderer that has the pattern.
